DIRECTOR'S SPEECH



The year 2020 witnessed a change in the management of our organization. The first stress test was the outbreak of the pandemic which for a while disrupted our activities. At first, we knew very little about the coronavirus, and we worried about the health of the people we have been helping, as well as the health of our workers. But we managed to react promptly and were able to keep helping people in need and on the margins of society despite the pandemic - both home and abroad.

A significant feature was our support of excluded communities in Slovakia where we have been helping people to stand on their own feet for years. With the outbreak of the pandemic our help focused on protection against the spread of the virus and mitigation of the socio-economic effects of the crisis. Thanks to the distribution of face-masks, hygiene packs and water canisters for hand washing people were able to better protect themselves and their surroundings. We provided counselling in various situations regarding loss of employment and the shut-down of government offices. For the hundreds of children who had all of a sudden become isolated we provided extra teaching, so that they could catch up on what they had missed. In this way we helped to alleviate the impact



of the crisis on the life of people from excluded localities.

Despite the difficulties, we kept on helping in countries where people already lived in danger or which couldn't provide for basic needs before the pandemic. The pandemic has made such living conditions even more noticeable. In eastern Ukraine we have installed water pumps in hospitals and care homes in order to provide full-day access to water. For dozens of elderly people we provided briquettes for heating so that they wouldn't need to worry about winter. After the enormous explosion in Beirut, we repaired damaged windows and helped with food provisions. We continued the support of long-term development in the poorest countries. To families in Kenya, Nepal and Myanmar we helped initiate self-subsistence by donating goats, chicken, seedlings and crops.

We approached the crisis as an opportunity to transfer some activities to the online space and to further expand our work with teachers, future journalists, the young and public. We increased the mutual

understanding of the complicated world we live in. The inaugural online edition of the One World documentary film festival attracted a record number of visitors and extremely positive feedback. Global education guides created as a tool for important themes and discussions were ordered by hundreds of teachers across Slovakia. I'm pleased that interest in this area of our activities has been growing every year.

I value and appreciate that our work was praised by the Slovak Public Defender of Rights and the European Economic and Social Committee. There was so much commitment and professionality on the part of our colleagues, volunteers and external co-workers and I would like to use this opportunity to once again thank all of them.

Our work would not be possible without the support of our individual donors, companies and institutions. I want to thank everybody for standing behind us during such a difficult year and thus help us to contribute to Slovakia as an open, tolerant and giving country.

ABOUT US

People in Need Slovak Republic (SR) is a non-governmental non-profit organization. It was established in 1999 by a group of journalists who were touched by the crushing effects of the conflict in Kosovo on civilians at that time. Their spontaneous humanitarian response resulted in a desire to establish an organization that would address emerging crisis situations in the world.

Our mission is to help those who find themselves in danger, whether they are suffering because of the effects of conflict, natural disasters or desolate generational poverty. Working with excluded communities in Slovakia as well as providing educational activities we also contribute to the building of an open, tolerant and inclusive society.

Since then, our activities have grown and developed significantly. We operate across the world, as well as at home in Slovakia. Besides humanitarian aid we focus on long-term development cooperation projects, support of human rights, social integration and global education. Our priority remains real-world help as well as sustainable cooperation with local partners and efficient use of financial resources.

In the middle of 2016 we joined forces with the People in Need Czech Republic and we took on their projects focusing on excluded communities in Slovakia. Thus we started helping with the social integration of people pushed to the margins of society by poverty.

We also organize the international documentary film festival One World. The festival introduces serious issues from across the globe, as well as Slovakia. Our organization is a part of the international network People in Need.

HUMANITARIAN AID

Lebanon

WE CONTINUED TO HELP MITIGATE THE EFFECTS OF THE ONGOING CRISIS IN THE COUNTRY

The people of Lebanon went through an extremely difficult period in 2020. The COVID-19 pandemic represented only one, rather marginal issue. Throughout the year people witnessed multiple increases in the prices of basic foods and fuel which caused half the population to fall under the poverty line, unable to provide for basic necessities. Lebanon is also a country still recovering from the long-

term aftermath of the civil war that ended in 1990. It provides shelter to three generations of Palestinian refugees. In the last decade it became a refuge for 1.5 million refugees from Syria. Lebanon has the largest share of refugees in the world, in total 6.9 million people. For a country as small as Lebanon this represents an extremely demanding humanitarian and socio-economic challenge.

The devastating explosion in Beirut which destroyed a significant part of the city centre intensified the feelings of helplessness and worsened prospects for a better future. We have been operating in Lebanon continuously since 2017. Because of the worsening situation we are aware that our help will continue to be needed there, although we wished otherwise.





WE PROMPTLY REACTED TO THE EXPLOSION IN BEIRUT

On 4 August 2020 a huge explosion occurred in the port of Beirut. It claimed 200 lives, destroyed many residential houses and left 300,000 people without a home. People lost their shops, taxi drivers their cars and many others their entire means of earning a living. Whole neighbourhoods and infrastructure in several parts of Beirut suffered tremendous damage. All of this happened at a time when the country was already on the verge of economic collapse and for months had been tested by political and social convulsions and the



COVID-19 pandemic. Immediately after the explosion we decided to put to use our familiarity with the area. In order to help the people of Beirut we provided almost 18,000 EUR, and we sent out our field coordinator to the location. In the first days after the catastrophe we were providing basic foods, hygiene packs and medical supplies to the inhabitants directly in Beirut.

Straight after the explosion we participated in the official humanitarian aid effort provided by the government of the Slovak Republic. We flew 3.2 tonnes of chickpeas to Beirut that were donated to public canteens providing free food to the people from the areas

struck by the explosion. In the following phase we joined forces with the German non-profit organization Grünhelme. We helped to establish a provisional joinery workshop and started to repair windows and doors, so that the city inhabitants could return to their homes as soon as possible. We repaired 379 dwellings in total.

In total we provided help to 11,367 people after the Beirut explosion.

Prompt aid after the catastrophe was provided thanks to the Friends Club, the Real Gift, our donors, the Slovak Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs, the Slovak Ministry of the Interior and Alfa Bio, Ltd.

My husband worked in the port. He came home from work 30 minutes before the explosion. I thank God. I thank God for every day that we are alive and have each other. That we lost only our windows, doors, and my husband's job.

IN TRIPOLI WE HELPED CHILDREN AS WELL AS WHOLE FAMILIES

In 2020 in Tripoli we continued the education of children and youths from Lebanon and refugee families. We provided psychological support to them, their parents and close relatives. We transferred to distance forms of education and consulting in order to maintain regular contact, which helped to overcome this difficult period. For several weeks our education was the only one provided, since schools were closed and didn't transfer to online teaching as promptly. In this way, children could work on tasks and improve their basic

knowledge in maths, Arabic, French and English. In total we supported 65 children of school age who thanks to the efforts of our teachers managed to stay in their grade. We succeeded in enrolling 69 children into the state programme of accelerated education which makes up for missed education for older children. For smaller children aged 5-6 years we provided pre-school education which is compulsory in Lebanon only before entering the first grade. Refugee families can't afford it and it's not provided to them

by the state. In 2020 entering school is even more difficult for these children, as the starting of school in autumn was delayed. It was also unclear whether the Lebanese ministry of education would accept their certificate of pre-school education since it was partially attended in distance form via mobile phones. After a long, tense wait, in November we were informed that the ministry had approved the certificates of 152 children and allowed them to enter into local schools. Thanks to this support children from deprived backgrounds will have the chance of a better future. The pandemic also placed a significant burden on the poorest families. We provided vouchers to purchase basic foods and hygiene essentials to 186 of them. We also helped them to top up credit to their mobile phones so that their children could participate in online tasks and education.

To 80 parents we provided a positive parenting course in order to contribute to the creation of a supportive environment for the development of children and youths. During the summer we increased aid and distributed emergency food vouchers to 100 families to purchase basic foods and meet their hygiene needs.

This success (approval of certificates) is so important because we managed to achieve it despite all the complications related to closed schools, the significant worsening of the financial situation of families, and institutions paralysed by protests. Our education continued in distance form also in a time of uncertainty on the side of the state authorities.

Albania

WE SUPPORTED THE VICTIMS OF THE EARTHQUAKE

At the end of 2019 a powerful earthquake occurred in Albania. Thousands of people were left without housing, food, medicine, electricity and warm clothing. Immediately after the catastrophe we set out to the location in order to evaluate needs and opportunities for help. Based on that more colleagues joined in January and helped in areas where official help did not arrive or was insufficient.

From the many affected families we selected those whose houses were damaged, who were living in tents or other non-sustainable conditions. We also did not forget the people who had lost their income or who had a close relative with a health impairment. In total



we helped 136 people, from little children to seniors.

We gave each family financial aid of 206 EUR to cover their most basic needs with a condition that 40% of the sum would be used in order to protect themselves from winter. In total we handed over 5,352 EUR.

This help could be provided thanks to regular supporters and the Real Gift.

Ukraine

A PLACE WHERE THE PANDEMIC MEETS CONFLICT

The elderly who remain living near the front line often don't have anyone to take care of them. Despite the war they didn't want or couldn't leave their homes because of trauma. With the minimal pensions they receive they can hardly cover their basic needs. They are afraid of the onset of winter, shortage of food as well as loneliness. Therefore, we provided the elderly near the front line with someone to take care of them, to be with them and to ensure they were able to heat

and survive the cold months in the warmth of their homes.

In 2020 we completed our year-long presence in Ukraine aimed at supporting elderly inhabitants in the villages of Myrne, Pavlopil, Kamianka and Anriivka near the front line near Maruipole. In total we repaired 50 houses and provided care to 144 seniors in need who were taken care of by 24 local carers. Carers whom we employed brought them water, groceries, medicine, tidied up their houses, helped with their gardens



and even cut their hair. Besides the basic needs they provided, they also became companions.

Thanks to our donors we collected more than 15,000 EUR that we used for buying 116 tonnes of wooden briquettes for 58 households in the villages of Hranitne and Kamyanka.

WE ALSO PROVIDED WATER FOR THE ELDERLY

The pandemic in Ukraine mostly endangered the elderly and vulnerable population near the front lines in Donetsk and Luhansk. Therefore, we decided to give them a helping hand. We provided stable access to clean water for 13 hospitals, 6 care homes and 1 shelter for internally displaced persons. These facilities often didn't have sufficient access to water manifested for example by several-day water cuts, access to water for only six hours a day or no access to water higher than the ground or first floor of a building. Two of the hospitals for which we secured access to water focused on the treatment of pandemic patients. We also provided further education on prevention and hygiene as well as accessible sanitary amenities. In summer our coordinator of humanitarian work Veronika Filípek set out to eastern Ukraine.

It was a difficult period full of overtime, work in hospitals with infection departments, dozens of PCR tests, complications with passing through military checkpoints. All the clinical facilities and care homes were extremely excited to have water all of a sudden also on the upper floors where it was missing. All of a sudden they could use it for the whole day.

WE FOCUSED ON SUPPORT FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH

After helping the elderly, in autumn 2020 we initiated help for children and young people in Donetsk. By the end of the year we managed to reconstruct 2 out of 5 social centres in the localities of Avdiivka and Bakhmut. These centres focus on psychosocial support and education of children. We provided equipment for didactic games and education to 15 centres of this kind. With the help of psychologists and social workers we started to provide psychosocial support for children, young people and their parents so that they could handle the effects of life in a conflict zone, high unemployment and poverty better. We also offered employment counselling to increase their employability. For parents we organized positive-parenting meetings in order to provide children with a more supportive environment in their development. These activities were adapted according to actual pandemic measures and therefore took place partially in distance form.

The realization that the situations around us cannot always be influenced comes continuously. What can be changed though is our point of view. During practical group tasks positive changes in lowering stress, tension and anxiety occur.

DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION

Moldova

WE OPENED CLIENT CENTRES TO PROVIDE EASIER ACCESS TO INFORMATION

Moldova is one of the poorest countries in Europe. Young people often leave abroad in search of better prospects and no longer participate in the life of the country. Therefore in 2020 we continued sharing our experience in building democracy and civil society. In the Gagauz region in the south we helped to open new client centres. According to the Slovak example these provide inhabitants with simple and transparent access to information and services in one place.



By initiating video coverage of local authority meetings and an information campaign we contributed to transparency in the operation of municipalities. For young people we organized trainings, counselling and financial support of their activities.

Albania

WE STRENGTHENED THE VOICE OF COMMUNITIES IN THE REGION

Also in 2020 we continued with the development of local communities in Tropojë - the poorest region of Albania. Besides an almost 80% unemployment rate, people suffer from poor schooling, limited access to information and deeply rooted governmental corruption. Tourism in the Albanian Alps is crucial for the future development of the region. Mining and construction of hydropower plants however interfere with biodiversity and endanger the lives of local people.

Therefore, we involved the inhabitants of the Albanian

Alps in activities aimed at their protection. Together we organized a petition against illegal sand mining which we managed ultimately to stop. We continue with our fight against the construction of hydropower plants.

We also organized a series of trainings and study visits in order to support community tourism, sustainable agriculture and development of business in the region.

This project was supported by the International Visegrad Fund.

HUMAN RIGHTS

Cuba

A SLIGHTLY FREER ISLAND

In 2020 intense repression of human rights and freedom of speech continued in Cuba. We tried to provide locals with independent and uncensored information in order to provide a realistic overview of the situation on the island. We supported the work of independent journalists, academics and activists. We contributed to the opportunity for 5 local partner organizations to freely publish information about the violation of human rights, to educate and to organize events and workshops. By attending



negotiations in the European Parliament and interviews with Cuban activists living in exile, we supported the advocacy activities.

Because of the pandemic, a planned visit of students from Cuba could not be organized. Therefore we provided it successfully in an online format. We focused on areas such as communication, fundraising, human rights and activism at the local level. We also supported the technical capabilities of 2 partner organizations – via initiation of a functional web-

site and international trainings aimed at the creation of their own podcast. Also this year the film festival One World introduced a film from the Cuban milieu. The documentary film *On the Starting Line* truthfully depicts the reality of the lives of young people on the island.

Our activities were financially supported by National Endowment for Democracy.

Philippines / Myanmar

IN THE PHILIPPINES AND MYANMAR WE TAUGHT YOUNG PEOPLE ABOUT MUTUAL TOLERANCE



The Philippines and Myanmar are countries that face serious conflicts due to poverty, religious and ethnic differences and struggles for territory and natural resources. Violence and tensions in the poorest regions have gone on for decades. Conflicts lead to discrimination and violent extremism, with local youth the most vulnerable. Supporting a long-term culture

of peace and mutual respect is crucial for the future lives of local inhabitants.

In 2020, despite worsened conditions, we educated and supported 231 young leaders. We helped them to build relationships, mutual respect and understanding, as well as to increase tolerance towards other communities. Young participants who completed our trainings consequently initiated activities in their own communities and thus set an example to others. We also involved 26 community non-governmental organizations in trying to build peace. We supported their operations and capabilities to complete their own projects focused on supporting tolerance and dialogue. We also helped them with mitigation of the aftermath of the pandemic.

This project was financed by the European Instrument for Democracy and Human Rights (EIDHR) and co-financed by the Czech Development Agency. Partners of the projects: People In Need Czech Republic and local organizations the Pailig Development Foundation and Building Better Society.



VOLUNTARISM

In 2020 the pandemic affected our plans for sending out volunteers. Moldova and Lebanon therefore had to wait until 2021. We were able to send out one volunteer to Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Bosnia and Herzegovina

WE HELPED PEOPLE WITH HEALTH IMPAIRMENT TO INTEGRATE INTO SOCIETY

Volunteer Ivana Godulová focused on the social inclusion of people with health impairment in Bosnia and Herzegovina. At the local branch of our sister organization People in Need Czech Republic she worked on activities so that these people could fully integrate not only into society but also into the labour market as well as to

strengthen their independence and economical status. Ivana for instance helped with research and organized training for employment counsellors who will accompany people with mental impairment throughout the whole working process. Thanks to Ivana's help the public became more sensitive towards people with impairment.

They can give us much more than we can give to them. They can be great workers. We should perceive them positively – see what they can offer, not negatively, seeing what they can't.

SOCIAL INTEGRATION PROGRAMMES

Slovakia

ALTHOUGH THE PANDEMIC DISRUPTED OUR ACTIVITIES, IT ACTUALLY ENABLED US TO HELP MORE

In Slovakia we've been leading community centres in five excluded localities: Plavecký Štvrtok, Petrovany, Roškovce, Kojatice and Sveržov. We provide social, financial as well as employment counselling. We lead pre-school clubs, provide extra teaching, develop career consultancy, and organize various community and leisure activities. Our community centres provide a space where people living in generational poverty can develop and find support. Our services and premises are also used by people from the majority society in the villages where we operate.



We try to dispel myths that the community centres are only for Roma people. Cooperation with partners – mainly municipalities, schools, kindergartens, doctors and various authorities and institutions is essential in all our efforts.

In spring 2020 the outbreak of the pandemic endangered all our activities.
All group activities were cancelled and our work was temporarily limited to helping with the crisis situations of our clients. In

times when protective equipment was still unavailable, we were looking for ways in which to protect our workers. Our highest priority was addressing the dire situation in excluded communities.

Besides looking for protective equipment we developed an emergency plan for the operation of our community centres. The design of the crisis management plan that we created was also adopted by the Implementation Agency of the Slovak Ministry of Labour, Social Affairs and Family for dozens of other community centres in the country. We cooperated with representatives of central and local government and became a part of the crisis staff in the regions of Prešov and Banská Bystrica. One of our experts with experience in refugee camps was provided as a manager for the quarantining of 92 people in the village Žehra. We regularly informed the public about the situation and we participated in the information campaign #koronatemeral. We were also invited to debates on the situation in excluded communities.



WE HELPED FIGHT THE PANDEMIC ALSO BEYOND OUR COMMUNITIES

From the start of the pandemic we distributed face-masks thanks to our volunteers in all our communities. At the beginning when there was a shortage, our colleagues were sewing them in community centres. Throughout the year we distributed hygiene packs with shampoo for children and adults, disinfection for surfaces and hands, soap, toilet paper and face-masks in 5 of our centres. We carried out surface disinfection in 4 localities and we provided one disinfection machine to the firefighters in Lučenec.

To the most badly affected families who had lost

their income because of the pandemic we repeatedly provided food aid. Food packages usually contained basic foods such as flour, salt, sugar, beans, peas, bread-crumbs, rice, several packs of pasta and instant soups, long-lasting milk, oil, spices, cans of meat, pates and bread. In some localities – such as Kojatice – we also helped with clothing. To the most vulnerable households we provided also medicine or special help with stoves and wood for winter.

Many families from the poorest localities didn't have access to tap water without which they could not wash their



hands, clean their households and thus protect themselves from the virus. To 350 households in 7 localities with limited access to water (Kojatice, Svinia, Mníšek, Lipany, Arnutovce, Rožkovany, Lomnička) and another 10 localities in cooperation with Healthy Regions we distributed 10-litre canisters with a tap together with soap and face-masks.

Thanks to our colleagues who enthusiastically worked in difficult conditions we managed to help thousands of people over the year, not only in our communities, but also in many others. Our help in this area together with our other activities were awarded by the Slovak Public Defender of Rights, awarding us with the "Public Defender's Thanks 2020". We also received an award from the European Economic and Social Committee for our initiative "Their Health is Our Health" focused on help for families in excluded communities. We cherish both awards tremendously.

WHEN YOU CAN'T COME TO THE CENTRE, THE CENTRE COMES TO YOU



Despite the difficult situation and initial complications we managed to continue with our work; we didn't shorten our working hours or hours for our clients. We were forced to improvise and change the forms of provided services. From indoors we moved outdoors; we worked more via phone and

online. After ensuring protective equipment we fully focused on fieldwork among communities. Thus, we could inform them about the current situation and measures, and map the needs of people.

Since children could not spend their free time in the community centres as they were used to, in some localities we provided board games and distributed them to households. In this way they could spend their time meaningfully with their parents or siblings.

Throughout the whole year we continued with counselling in all forms: social, financial and employment. The pandemic emphasized the value of the community centres. They became more relevant partners for schools, authorities and public institutions since we were able to provide a connection between them and people

from the communities. Contacts with local authorities, the post office and doctors were provided more than before, since telephone and online communication for many people from excluded communities was difficult. The counselling services at the community centres were used by 570 adults to whom we provided 3,025 interventions.

In total we worked with 1,047 children and adults in our community centres and we provided our services and interventions 8,297 times.

Our activities within the socio-legal protection of children and social guardianship, provision of preventive measures, support in education and low-threshold activities in our centres as well as in the field could be provided thanks to the support of the Bratislava and Prešov regional authorities.

PROJECT HOME (DOM.OV) FULFILLING DREAMS OF HOME OWNERSHIP

In 2020 we continued with our efforts to provide people from Slovak excluded communities with decent housing. Our non-profit daughter organization Project Home which we established in cooperation with the Association for a Better Life and the Slovenská sporiteľna bank assists people in self-building low-cost family houses in the Košice, Prešov, and Banská Bystrica regions.

To obtain such a house is far from easy. Clients have to build up their savings for a year, and after that they apply for a loan from the bank so that together with the construction consultants they can build their houses. The construction process itself is preceded by

a long process of preparation of land and infrastructure, as well as education and advice on how to free themselves from debts. After building approval they start paying off the loan.

By 2020 Project Home managed to complete and approve 16 houses in the villages of Rankovce and Lenartovce. The number of active clients in the programme rose from 110 to 174. The pandemic has partially slowed down the preparations for construction, several clients have lost their jobs and their income has fallen, which has negatively affected their ability to save. Despite these complications we are very happy that in 2020 Project Home received the SozialMarie award for social



innovation and the Roma Spirit award for their unique approach to housing solutions in excluded communities.

WE HELPED WITH EMPLOYMENT AND WITH FREEING THEM FROM DEBTS

Because of the pandemic many people lost their jobs as well as the opportunity of temporary work. Besides looking for job opportunities we helped our clients to sort out their financial problems. Thanks to the possibility of claiming personal bankruptcy some of them received the chance of a fresh start. Besides our five community centres we assisted also with the employment counselling centre that we run in the village of Spišské Podhradie.

Via our BBSK labour agency we developed cooperation with the Banská Bystrica regional authority and the city of Lučenec. Thanks to the agency it was





possible to find jobs (short-term or long-term) for dozens of clients from the region, out of which more than half were members of the majority society. The agency also provided dozens of courses – from financial literacy to digital skills and practising job interviews. It created a 700-plus-member database of people interested in jobs which we used also when looking for help in quarantine centres, care homes and for help with area testing in the Banská Bystrica region.

EMPLOYMENT AND FINANCIAL COUNSELLING IN NUMBERS:

BECAUSE OF THE PANDEMIC WE INTENSIFIED THE EDUCATION OF CHILDREN

Because of the pandemic, children across the whole of Slovakia moved to distance learning. Those affected by generational poverty often don't even have a table on which to work on their homework assignments, never mind a computer or tablet. The education of children who all of a sudden ended up being isolated therefore became our priority.

The communities in which we operate are varied; therefore, we helped each of them slightly differently. Where possible, children worked on their homework assignments in the community centres. Later

we provided consultations outdoors, via phone, email or social networks. In families with access to the internet we helped teach both children and their parents how to work with websites used by teachers for assignments. For children

from the poorest localities with no access to phones or internet we delivered printed assignments in person and we looked for ways in which to connect community centres with schools. Community workers also involved parents

In the first half year I got a tablet. It helped me a lot because I could access distance learning. Thanks to you I am moving further. I hope you will keep supporting me and I value it very much.

During the holidays we organized a summer school where we connected formal education with the informal. Besides reading comprehension and counting, children learnt about nature and growing vegetables. In a playful way they revised or caught up on various subjects and kept up the learning habit. Entering the next school year was then much easier for them.

During the whole year we worked with children from the second stage of elementary schools and we also maintained contact with high-school students and teachers. For students who were supported by our scholarship we provided tablets and computers instead of covering their costs for travel to and from school. In Plavecký Štvrtok we managed to set up a mentor programme for highschool students within which the students with the help of volunteers work on their personal growth. Two students continued in a dual learning programme.

ONE SMALL STEP FOR A MAN, ONE GIANT LEAP FOR THE FUTURE OF THE WHOLE COMMUNITY

The long-term and complex work of our colleagues at the community centres is like a long-distance race. Results often show after months or years of intensive cooperation. It seems however that the personal approach, dedicated time and acceptance the people from excluded communities find in the community centres helps them not to give up on their path to a better future. Therefore, we value every small success. Besides fighting the pandemic last year and our traditional counselling we noticed several of those:



- We provided several pilot meetings of women's groups in Petrovany and Sveržov which created a good base for more regular meetings in the following year.
- During the period of online teaching we initiated very fruitful cooperation with several elementary schools. We presented ourselves as an important partner. In Kojatice we initiated cooperation with the local elementary school as well as during the summer school.
- We persuaded several parents to come for extra teaching together with their children.
- More finishing students expressed interest in studying at high school. Thank to employment counselling several adults started searching for job offers individually.
- Members of the community in Sveržov organized a group of volunteers to remove illegally dumped waste, revitalize the children's playground and build a gazebo.
- Several families in Roškovce connected to the village well and self-built bathrooms in their households.

WE SHARED OUR EXPERIENCE ALSO IN A THEORETICAL FORM

In October 2020 a final conference took place. Together with non-governmental organizations from the Prešov region we shared our experience on the integration of excluded Roma communities. We believe that in this way we can achieve significant improvements in the process of integration of excluded communities in Slovakia as well

as at the level of public policy. The project resulted in a series of analyses, studies, measures, legislative proposals and methodologies which can be found at our website: www.clovekvohrozeni.sk/co-robime/programy-socialnej-integracie/

The conference was organized within the project Better Public Policies for Marginalized Roma Communities.

GLOBAL **EDUCATION**

Slovakia

TEACHING (AND LEARNING) IN **GLOBAL CONTEXTS**

Within the Global Education Department we have been developing a so-called course approach. It's very much appreciated by teachers and associated professionals at schools since it doesn't add unnecessary "extra" work but can bring global themes into teaching plans. It enables us to introduce sensitive topics to teachers for whom e.g. migration or gender equality might seem uncomfortable.

Within this approach we prepared several training publications in cooperation with teachers. Global Education in subjects such as Slovak language, ethics and geog-



raphy was ordered by 1,599 teachers. Based on the data they filled out when submitting their order our guides reached 134,863 pupils across Slovakia. A further 378 teachers ordered our educational materials when working with documentary films from our One World festival. These served in total 43,230 pupils.

We helped to improve competences in topics such as poverty, climate change, migration, human rights, gender equality, extremism and critical thinking for 356 teachers and associated professionals. We organized webinars, online trainings, as well as an intensive course for teachers lasting several months combining in-person training with e-learning.

I really like the way the guide is conceived. It opened my horizons and helped to orient the topics of my lessons towards crucial social issues which I had found rather demanding before.

WE ENABLED PEOPLE TO SEE THE WORLD BETWEEN THE LINES

Within the World Between the Lines initiative, which has been running for several years and focuses on current and future journalists, we organized 48 educational workshops and seminars. These were attended by 222 participants who have - or will have - the opportunity to cover important social issues not only in Slovakia. We published 4 sets of educational materials, including academic texts, and completed 3 analyses on topics of migration and climate change.

Also in 2020 we continued to develop our cooperation with media, including the daily newspaper Hospodárske noviny (HM Global and HN Global



Academy), Ringier Axel Springer (Digital Media Campus) and with two university departments of journalism – at the Faculty of Arts of Comenius University in Bratislava and the Faculty of Arts of Constantine the Philosopher University in Nitra. We participated in the preparation of media content that was read by hundreds of thousands of

people. On the topic of migration alone we reached 270,000 people.

Within the courses Global Development Journalism and Global Challenges for Journalists and Non-Journalists we published a university guide and thus supported the institutional anchoring of our work in the academic sector.



CORONAVIRUS SPECIAL

During the first coronavirus wave we reacted to the acute demand for home education and the new needs of teachers and associated professionals. We prepared an educational coronavirus special for teachers. In one place they could find a lot of high quality training content which could also be

used during online teaching. Materials were also provided by the organizations Živica and the Milan Šimečka Foundation. The website www.globalnevzdelava-nie.sk/vzdelavaciematerialy/ was recommended by the Slovak Ministry of Education (including the teaching-organizational instructions).

CHOICE 2050

The artistic-educational exhibition Choice 2050 emphasized the importance of a stable climate. It artistically presented two possible scenarios for the path of mankind in the context of climate change. The first reflected path was based on our current approach. The second scenario represented a positive path which would take into consideration the recommendations of the world scientific community. The exhibition consisted of drawings, videos, objects and two timelines

SUMMER SCHOOL RESOLVED SYSTEMIC CHALLENGES

Our great (fulfilled) dream was the organization of a summer school for young people from across Slovakia. Over five days we created a safe space in which we overturned the preconception of leadership based on individualism. We focused on the importance of the collective and cooperation in solving the challenges we face. We talked mainly about climate change, poverty and migration. We also focused on personal growth based on group dynamics and the challenges of permanently sustainable development.



I met inspirational people with whom I could talk about important topics and create new friendships. The content of the whole summer school was enriching and I learned a lot. For example, I found out how teams and projects function and I also learnt new things about myself.

World film festival. The aim of the project is to support young authorial documentary creation as well as to help filmmakers find a way towards less stereotypical portrayals of migration.

IMPORTANT THEMES BROUGHT TO SLOVAK HOUSEHOLDS BY ONE WORLD

The 21st year of the One World international film festival represents a fine example of how a responsible approach and good planning can change a crisis into an opportunity. The One World team not only prepared an online version of the festival, they also decided to organize a first-rate festival which managed to reach out to people who normally don't attend cinema theatres.

We renewed our community screenings project named One World on Demand via which *Mr. Toilet* reached more than 500 people.

One World had a presence also in the regions. In 2020 it took place for example in Košice and Lučenec; however, partners from Humenné, Spišský Hrhov and Liptovský Mikuláš also participated in the Slovakia-wide online festival.

The winning film of the Czech One World Festival Sing Me a Song and the Slovak premieres of Grief and Unseen could also be watched by viewers with hearing and sight impairment. Special screeings were prepared in cooperation with the Department of Translation Studies of the Faculty of Arts of Constantine the Philosopher University in Nitra and the company Teledata. Audiodescriptions were voiced by the Slovak actress Táňa Pauhofová.

The festival took place under the auspices of the President of Slovakia Zuzana Čaputová and the Mayor of Bratislava Matúš Vallo.

THE FRIENDS OF PEOPLE IN NEED SR CLUB

FRIENDS CLUB DONORS FREE US TO HELP PEOPLE IN NEED

The Friends Club consists of donors who help People in Need SR with donations on a monthly basis. Their regular support enables us to create a financial fund which can be used e.g. in case of a sudden natural or humanitarian disaster when speed of assistance is crucial.

People from excluded communities found themselves in a very difficult situation in 2020 because of the coronavirus. They soon needed help in terms of food. Thanks to Friends Club donors we could support the distribution of humanitarian aid and protective equipment in our community centres. We provided regular aid with food to 339 households.

The prompt help of the Friends Club also extended to Lebanon. After the warehouse

explosion in Beirut that left hundreds dead and thousands of homes damaged and destroyed we could help immediately thanks to the regular donors and the financial reserve we created. In this sorely tested country we could help repair damaged homes and provide food for inhabitants.

Thanks to the Friends Club we also helped after the earthquake in Albania that destroyed the homes of thousands of people at the end of 2019. We took to the field and looked for those who hadn't received any help, those for whom the help hadn't been sufficient and those living in unsustainable conditions. We helped to cover their most urgent needs and protect them from the cold.

Besides immediate humanitarian aid the Friends Club also helps with our long-term projects based in Slovakia and abroad.

For example in Slovakia we could support employment and education in excluded communities. The resources of the Friends Club enabled us to use a service car and accompany our clients at the start of their employment. They also supported employment counselling for adults and youth from excluded communities. Within the Global Education Department we could provide training to teachers and associated professionals and help improve the quality of future journalists from across Slovakia.

Thanks to the Friends Club we could develop our foreign branches in Kenya and Lebanon. We are delighted with their success and the opportunity to better support these communities.

The Friends Club also enables us to move forward in

our work. Strengthening the internal capabilities and employees of People in Need SR means better and more professional help for the people we work with.

With each member of the club our ability to help increases. Towards the end of 2020 we had 1,532 precious regular donors. Thanks to them we managed to collect financial support of 167,575 EUR. We also rolled over an unused 35,342 EUR from 2019 to 2020.

Unused funds of 98,477 EUR from the Friends Club were rolled over to be used in 2021. We don't plan to use the full fund of the Friends Club since it also serves as a reserve fund for cases of sudden natural or humanitarian disaster. It enables us to promptly help people in need.

THE REAL GIFT

WHEN YOU GIVE SOMETHING REALLY IMPORTANT

The charity e-shop Real Gift has again offered gifts that provide real help to people in need. Donors could choose at www. skutocnydarcek.sk from 21 gifts which could help in 4 areas: health, livelihood, education and help in Slovakia.

Thanks to Real Gift we could provide extra teaching to Slovak children who could not attend school because of the pandemic. Domestic conditions can be unsuitable for online learning, which was the case for most of the pupils. Thus the need to help was very significant. Besides extra lessons we also distributed work sheets, helped with homework assignments and communicated with schools.

In Slovakia we could also distribute protection and hygiene equipment as well as



water canisters. Those helped to improve hygiene in localities with no access to mains water. Thanks to the Real Gift named First Steps children from excluded communities could go for a summer trip, some of them for the first time in their lives. They visited a swimming pool, cinema or went for a trip to the city or Spiš Castle. A unique experience was also a pizza or an ice-cream. We could also print more of the methodological guides of Global Education for teachers of Slovak language and ethics and provide them to schools.

In Lebanon we could provide summer holiday experiences, learning aids and aids for art therapy to children thanks to Real Gift. Many children in the country suffer from anxiety and need help to process the difficult situation they live in. After the warehouse explosion in Beirut we could promptly help with food aid as well as with hygiene equipment.

In Ukraine we helped solitary elderly people living near the front line of the civil war to prepare for the cold of winter. In the village of Piesky, because of the conflict the inhabitants had lost basic belongings such as underwear and warm clothing. From their small pensions these seniors find it difficult to ensure the basic necessities for a dignified life.

This year again we distributed Real Gifts in Kenya. These were goats, chickens, sheep as well as seedlings. All of these went to internally displaced families in central Kenya so they could build up their small farms and make a living.



We delivered 460 animals and 3,000 tree seeds as well as tools and training for the effective breeding of animals.

Chicken and goats were distributed to 68 vulnerable families in Nepal in the regions of Gorkha and Sindhupalchok where agriculture remains the main source of income for locals. Since the earthquake in 2015 landslides have kept occurring and made it more difficult for farmers to start over and get back on their feet. The animals we provided are serving as a source of eggs, milk and also future income in the shape of offspring.





In 2020 we delivered gifts to the value of 82,962 EUR. Remaining gifts are to be delivered in 2021.

In 2020 our donors bought Real Gifts in the record sum of 122,699 EUR. Also in 2021 we will be able to deliver joy and help more people around the world and in Slovakia. The generosity of donors reveals itself mainly during the Christmas season when many people seek how to give in a sensible and original way. We want to thank all who chose Real Gifts.


Because of the limited opportunities during the pandemic we decided to roll over these funds to the following year. They will help us with our long-term education activities, development of social aid and support of human rights.



Opinion

- conclude on the appropriateness of the management and executive board's use of the going concern principle of accounting and, based on the obtained audit evidence, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the non-profit organization's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the non-profit organization to cease to continue as a going concern;
- ? evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of financial statements, including disclosures, and whether financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair representation.
